The call to follow Jesus may put us at odds with Americana Moral and Civil Religion. Because being a child of God transcends political and cultural affiliation. To be a citizen of this country is a true blessing, how we live that gift should be shaped by the love of Jesus Christ.

From climate change to national security, from immigration to economic fairness, we as a nation and as a church face difficult challenges. As Disciples of Christ, we have something to say about these issues and how we can act to ensure justice, mercy and fairness for all. God's people are instruments of God's saving work in the world. Our words and deeds are based in something much deeper and greater than the hot air of politics or the bombastic certainty of news commentators. Our moral compass is guided by the One who died on the cross. Our words and deeds of love are boldly proclaimed by the living Word of God.

In Galatians, the Apostle Paul writes about us as being inheritors of God's promises through baptism. There is neither Jew nor Greek, Republican or Democrat, slave or free, American or non-American, black or white or red, or blue or brown or yellow. There is no discrimination whether you are male or female, gay or straight. God shows no bias. He sent His Son to die for all of us, to forgive all of us and God's desire has been and will always be to save all of us.

We are called, chosen and sent into the world, not to be a part of it but to live in it. We are

- Beginning on September 7th at 7:05 p.m., we will begin a series on “The Lutheran Church,” a 500 year Journey! Each 60 minute class will be a self-contained look at the History and Belief of the Lutheran Church.
 - o 9/7 - Roman Catholic Reform (Why Martin Luther got kicked out of the Catholic Church) – What Baptism Means For Me?
 - o 9/14 - The Reformation and Europe (War, Plague and Faith) - What Communion means for us!
 - o 10/5 - Germans, Swedes, Norwegians and Danes (The beginning of our stereotypical heritage) - Law and Gospel
 - o 10/12 - The Politics of Religion (Catholics vs. Protestants) - The Apostle’s Creed
 - o 11/2 - Saints and Sinners (The power of God’s Grace) - The Bible
 - o 11/9 - Priesthood of all Believers (Clergy and the Church) - The Bible
 - o 11/16 - The Reformation isn’t over! (The future of the Church) - Our mission from God!
- New Member Class - On Sunday 18th and 25th between services in the church library, we will have our new member classes. This two-session class will help anyone who is interested in finding out more about the mission of St. Paul’s, our beliefs, who we are and what opportunities there are to grow, share, and serve in faith. Child care is provided; children of Sunday school age 3 years to 5th grade are invited to be a part of our educational program. People don’t have to have any previous church involvement to be a part of the community of faith here at St. Paul’s. All are welcome!
- Thursday Morning Bible Study - Nearly every Thursday morning at 6:30 a.m. in the church library, there is a gathering of folks who wish to study God’s Word, our profession of faith, the beliefs of Christianity as well as other Faiths and the history and future of Christianity.
- Sunday Forums October 2nd, November 6th and December 4th - Each forum will be 50 minutes in length and cover the topics below; there will be a presentation as well as time for Q & A. If something occurs that needs a topic change, we will do so to meet the needs of the congregation.
 - o 10/2 - Christianity, Islam and Judaism - This will be a discussion on the similarities, the differences, culture vs. faith and the Tri-Faith Initiative.
 - o 11/6 - Faith of our Fathers and Mothers, Remembering Veteran’s Day. How do we support our military families, how do we honor those who served in the Armed Forces and how do we share our Patriotism without being political.
 - o 12/4 - Culture vs. Christmas. The challenge to hold our personal religious beliefs and practices in a pluralistic. How does our particular Lutheran traditions match or differ from other Christians and non-Christians.
- Sunday Morning Adult Education Classes and Discussions - Pastor Paul and Pastor Sarah will offer different opportunities for adult learning and faith formation. Because of the varied topics and schedules, these classes will be announced on a month by month basis. Please take note of announcements online, in the bulletins and in special e-mails. The Winter/Spring schedule will be available in November.

Youth Education

Affirmation of Baptism is not “Required”
(I bet that got your attention.)

Confirmation, as a word, is the validation of learning and knowledge toward one’s Faith Journey. Traditionally, our youth have been Confirmed in their Faith, and they boldly stand up in front of God and everybody and confess their faith during the Affirmation of Baptism Ceremony on Reformation Sunday. They are not “required” to do so, unless a member of the family deems it so, but we, at the church, do not make them do it. It is something we encourage, support and go out of our way to help make happen. We uphold parents and sponsors who made a vow to raise up that child from Baptism to Confirmation. We provide a program and a learning experience that enhances a Faith Journey that never truly ends. So, the word Confirmation is being looked at differently this year as we kick off classes, service projects and worship leadership. Classes will be labeled as “Core,” “Elective” and “Fun” within the context of wanting to continue through the high school years and into adulthood, to enhance all of our Faith Questions with answers and more questions. We don’t want to “graduate” youth out of our Confirmation Program but Affirm their Baptism, as we all continue on a Faith Formation Journey.

So, how much will change this year within Confirmation? Not much, just the words, terminology and overall view of the process (and, we will do this as Vibrantly as we can).

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

During the last three months, we've talked about the five principles of Vibrant Faith. I hope you are catching on to the idea that helping others to form faith takes much more than one hour each Sunday, Sunday School teachers, a single church staff, one parent, a sermon or youth group. Each of these play an integral role in helping all ages to grow in faith. Each person needs a community and a variety of experiences to help him or her understand God's love. Community can include those who you see every day at school, church or work, but may be much wider for individuals including those in other countries, mission groups, etc. With the rise of social media, communities continue to expand.

This month, we look at the fourth principle which is, "Faith is more often caught than it is taught." As I grow older, I've become more of a hands-on learner. Gone are the days when I want to sit in a room memorizing a bunch of facts so I can regurgitate them for a test. Having the opportunity to watch someone model a project in a step-by-step video, create something of my own or work together on a project has helped me to learn new things.

When I think of how faith has been formed in my life, I did have ample opportunities to memorize Bible stories or important information for Confirmation. I was even blessed to have a test in Confirmation each week regarding the information that was discussed the previous week! Before I was confirmed, I got to stand in front of the congregation and be quizzed on ANY of the tests I'd had over the two years! After Confirmation, I was the high school student who visited classrooms of younger kids and quizzed them on Bible memory verses, the Ten Commandments, etc. Yes, I learned a lot this way, but I'm not sure I could give you all the Commandments in the right order or state each of Luther's explanations. Did I catch faith from these things? Maybe...

One of the most formative opportunities for me to catch faith was by attending Bible camp. Imagine being an upper elementary student and getting to spend an entire week with a really cool college person! I remember feeling so loved, getting to see these people pray, read the Bible and be excited because they loved Jesus. Everything they did was because they wanted me, and my cabin mates, to grow in our faith. Not only did I get to watch them, but I got to try my hand at leading. These really cool counselors asked me to pray, let me read Bible verses for Bible study, asked what songs I wanted to sing for worship and on and on. I could see them doing all they did because of their great love for Jesus and their love was contagious! How could I not want to follow Christ when I had such amazing examples?!

You may have noticed we've spent a lot of time this past year trying to help all ages participate and lead in worship. Adults and kids of all ages have ushered, greeted, run the sound, served communion, led the Apostles' Creed, helped with prayers, etc. We've even asked older youth to help with VBS, lead Sunday School opening or serve a meal. This is intentional! By leading, we learn. We catch faith, but we also make connections that keep us coming back.

Who might you ask to join you in a project, Bible study or discussion? How might he or she catch faith from you? This is Vibrant Faith.

Hector Villarreal - Nursery Coordinator



A fellow teacher once gave me a T-shirt which read “Kids are My Business.” I recently visited with someone who truly works, lives and breathes that “Kids are His Business.” Meet Hector Villarreal, Nursery Coordinator at St. Paul’s Lutheran Church of

Millard. Hector was born in Texas and spent his first four years in Mexico. His father had been a farm worker and migrated to Council Bluffs to work in the Omaha slaughter houses. Hector’s mother was mostly a stay-at-home mom, working for a time for Blue Star Foods which became part of Con-Agra Foods. He is one of seven children, having three brothers and three sisters.

Attending Council Bluffs schools, Hector graduated from Thomas Jefferson High School. He then went to college in Texas where he majored in fashion, earning an Associate’s Degree in Applied Arts and Science. However, his career path led him to go into financial services. Following that path, Hector moved from Texas to Colorado to Los Angeles and, eventually, back to Council Bluffs. He worked for almost 16 years for First Data Corp., managing the operations units in the U.S. & Mexico that handled money transfers. He also did a “short stint” with Mutual of Omaha. He is now a consultant on revenue strategies for Carlson Rezidor Hotels, a career that requires travel throughout the U.S., Canada and Latin America. An added benefit is that he is able to work from home.

In addition to his work with Carlson, he has also worked with Iowa Foster and Adoptive Parents Association. With IFAPA, Hector provided support and training to Foster & Adoptive Families throughout Iowa with a focus on his region, Southwest Iowa. He is a certified trainer in various parenting courses designed by IFAPA as well as training developed by The National Center for Trauma Informed Care.

In 2000, while in L.A., he started his own family

becoming a single parent to two boys and a girl, ages 2, 3 and 4. Hector met his husband, David in 2011 while attending a Justice for Children Summit. David, who holds a Master’s Degree in Public Administration and also worked in Child Welfare Service, is now a stay-at-home parent. Pastor Paul married them August 20, 2015, and the number of children in the family now totals seven, each child having been in the foster care system at one time. Hector and David are about to be grandparents with two grandsons expected; one in August and one in October.

When asked how the family came to St. Paul’s, Hector shared that they moved to Omaha to a house near Pastor Paul’s. When they moved into the neighborhood, Jane and Pastor Paul welcomed them with baked goods. Another neighbor, Betty (sister of SPLC Administrative Assistant Jan Lundgren) also brought baked goods. “So,” Hector smiled, “You might say baked goods brought us to St. Paul’s.” Hector now coordinates the nursery at St. Paul’s which has given him the opportunity to serve the congregation.

He hopes people will recognize the nursery as part of the Children’s Ministry where children have a safe place to be and develop social skills while their parents can worship without the stress of managing children during the service. Nursery coverage is a budgeted item, with the nursery being available during St. Paul’s scheduled events. Cameras allow parents to observe all nursery activities and a paging system is also in place so they can contact parents. The staff is trained in child safety and baby wellness.

There is a brief sketch of the life of Hector Villarreal--father, grandfather, advocate for children and coordinator of St. Paul’s Nursery. Oh, yes, “Kids are his business!!!”
