NEBRASKA SYNOD ASSEMBLY

We remember singing "The Church is not a building, the Church is not a steeple, the Church is not a resting place, the Church is the people." The theme for the 2016 Nebraska Synod of the ELCA Assembly proclaimed just that: "We are Church" and emphasized the message from Ephesians 4:3-6 that "We are Church...Called in Hope...Diverse in Mission... and United in Christ." The assembly convened in Kearney on June 2 and adjourned June 4. The banquet Thursday evening recognized rostered leaders celebrating milestone years of ordination or commission. St. Paul's delegation was blessed to share in honoring our own Pastor Paul for his 30 years of ordination.

Called in Hope, Diverse in Mission and United in Christ was reflected in all the speakers' messages and in all the programs presented. These were not just promotional reminders as a part of some marketing scheme. These were scripture-based calls for us as the Church to continue the work of Jesus by His directions as found in ancient writings, but meant to be lived in 2016!!

Bishop Brian Maas spoke on the text from Luke 7 where Jesus raised the widow's son from the dead saying, "Young man, I say to you arise!" The Bishop applied this to the Church; saying we must follow Jesus's command, and as the boy got out of his coffin, we as Church must get out of the box. We must get out of the box of comfort zones, fear of diversity and selfish hesitation. We must continue the work of Jesus wherever and whenever we can. Some of the ways the Church is striving to do this were mentioned including Table Grace in Omaha, the Sudanese outreach in Ralston and the Lutheran Disaster Response Team. In world connections, we heard about the Sudanese National Ministry of the ELCA called "Reconciled in Service" and actually led by two men from opposing tribes!! The Church is also active in working to end human trafficking and in making malaria a disease of the past. All of these ways of serving Christ's family take no notice of race, religious connection, economic status, geographic origin or any other diversity which might try to put a tear in the fabric of the human tapestry. "All are one in Him!"

The keynote speaker was Peter Marty, former host of the national radio ministry "Grace Matters" and author of <u>The Anatomy of Grace</u>. He encouraged us to "get up and do something with your life." He said that the opposite of faith is refusal to move. Pastor Marty also addressed being united in Christ as not just tolerating those who might be different from us, but truly loving and caring for them. He reminded us of the verses in Acts 15 "we believe it is by the Grace of the Lord Jesus that we are saved and so are they." We need to remember Jesus was a refugee. He knew his origins, He knew where He was going and He took up the role of servant and "washed their feet." Pastor Marty helped us recall we live together as a gift from God and that community is often a place where the person you want to be with the least wants to live.

Mikka McCraken is the Director of Planning and Engagement for World Hunger for the ELCA. She is a living message--adopted from a Korean poverty situation, she grew up in Minnesota and now heads a serving arm of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. She exhibits a great calling of hope. She is from a diverse background, and all her gifts and ministry are united in the love of Christ.

Business was minimal with elections and a few resolutions which can be found on the Nebraska Synod web page. One critical message which was repeated often was the serious need for pastors. We were reminded to listen for the call in our own lives and also to "step out of the box" when we recognize the gifts for pastoring in others. Our drawing attention to their gifts may ignite a spark they had not recognized in their own talents. Be prayerfully aware!! The assembly was managed efficiently and opportunities were there to see "old" friends and meet new ones. The weekend was filled with the message of Christ's love and of ways to "get out of the box" and "be Church." We are thankful for the opportunity to have represented St. Paul's at this 2016 assembly. We pray we may apply what we heard and witnessed to continue the work of Jesus here at St. Paul's Lutheran Church of Millard.

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

Our series on Vibrant Faith's principles for faith formation continues with the fourth principle which is "Faith is caught more than it is taught."

I'd like for you to take a minute and think of a time when you've noticed a child doing or saying something you normally do. Have you ever caught yourself doing something your parent did? I'm always amazed when a word or action comes from one of my kids and I know they learned it from me! I also realize how much I'm turning into my mother as time goes on. Just the other day, Scott was driving and an animal jumped out in front of the car. I instantly grabbed the door handle like my mom does. This used to drive me NUTS when I was learning to drive, and now, I'm doing the same thing to Scott! He didn't even have to say anything. He just looked at me, and I said, "Yeah, I'm turning into my mother!"

We often learn by watching those around us. We pick up patterns, sayings, good habits and maybe not so good habits. Others' actions become ingrained in who we are, and I think this is exactly what the fourth principle is about. As a kid, I watched my parents become highly involved in church. I saw them gather with friends to make popcorn balls for the treat bags after the Children's Christmas Worship. They helped with all the things my sisters and I were involved with, sang in the choir, helped with Easter breakfasts and went on mission trips. My mom was constantly at church for some ladies' meeting. You can bet that my parents were around church if something needed to be done. Not only did I see my parents volunteering at church, but I saw them growing in their own faith at home, too. My mom's Bible still sits on the kitchen table. Whenever I stay at their house, I know that the Bible sitting on the table means she has read it for the day. I know she says prayers at bedtime, falls asleep talking to God and wakes up still talking to Him. I caught faith because I saw my parents living theirs out.

As I grew older, I had the awesome privilege to go to Bible camp. I got to spend a week each summer watching "cool" college people live out their faith. Whether they were washing dishes, cleaning bathrooms, serving as a life guard or leading a Bible study, they were modeling what faith was. I caught faith because these counselors invested in me and showed me how to follow Christ.

I also caught faith from my pastors. When I was in middle school and high school, the pastors at my church were a husband and wife team. Gretchen and Dwight invited me to lead in the congregation. I wrote Easter sunrise services with my best friend. I made banners for the sanctuary. I was on a long-range planning team with ADULTS! I caught faith because they allowed me to lead, to see more of church than worship and youth group.

Who have you caught faith from? How did these people shape who you are and your understanding of God's great love for you? And who is watching you? Will they catch faith from you? What we say may be easily forgotten, but how we live our lives might influence another to know Christ. This is Vibrant Faith.

The Holy Family Shrine sits high above the Interstate in Gretna, Nebraska. Many people passing below have wondered about "that corn crib on the hill." On June 21, twelve members of St. Paul's Grace Circle and of the Tuesday Morning Bible Study group made a trip to the Shrine.

Meeting for lunch at the Cracker Barrel, we car pooled to the Shrine and spent about an hour and a half learning about the mission of the site and exploring the grounds. The founders of the Holy Family Shrine wanted to "create a place for travelers to seek out the intervention of the Holy Spirit, to be at peace, to heal, to be comforted, to pray and to discover or rediscover the saving power of Jesus Christ enshrined in the Holy Family and in the Christian Faith."

There is a peace inside and out. A continuous stream of water trickles from the Visitors' Center to the altar in the sanctuary, reminding us of the waters of life and of the cleansing waters of baptism. Outside the native grasses, the gentle breezes (at least on that day) and the songs of birds remind us of the beauty of God's creation. The Shrine is supported by donations and no entrance fee is charged. It is well worth the trip to this "corn crib on the hill" to experience the peace and inspiration there, where you almost forget that the ribbon below is the noisy and speeding traffic of Interstate 80.

"Finding Dory" Rated PG, currently in the theaters. This is part two of the Disney/Pixar hit "Finding Nemo." What is sad is that this could have been prevented if folks had paid closer attention and asked the men and women who were on the ground there.
